



Twice a year, the First Step program offers a dental clinic where a mobile dentist crew cleans and provides dental screenings for children.


First Step connects with children and their families through quality services...


Community Link's First Step Early Learning and Family Support Program consists of Early Intervention, which is a state funded program of services for children, ages 0-3, with developmental delays or disabilities; Early Head Start, which is a federally funded program of home based prenatal services and services for children, ages 0-3; Infant Mental Health Services, which identify children at risk for developmental delays and/or for social-emotional and mental health problems; Child Waiver, which assists families in keeping their loved ones in their own home rather than seeking a more restrictive environment; Community Services, which include free parenting classes on a variety of topics; and Developmental Screenings, which are conducted annually through local school districts and child care centers, as well as by parent or guardian request. �


Connecting with Parents through Social Media...


The First Step Program has begun to use a few different social media platforms to effectively stay connected with families. The program has recently implemented a private Facebook group only for waitlisted families, enrolled families, committee members, and staff only. By having a private Facebook group, families are reminded of upcoming playgroups, community events, important updates for the program and community, and more. This avenue helps build an opportunity for families to better connect and support each other.

In addition to the private Facebook group, First Step has been in the process of using Pinterest as another outlet to connect with families and the community as a whole. Staff creates a Pinterest board while planning for playgroups and parent trainings so that families can recreate the activities, games, songs, recipes, and more at home. The program has also been using Pinterest to incorporate parent suggestions in planning playgroups and some enrolled families have been using this social media platform to find new ideas and share with their Parent Educator as they plan upcoming home visits together. First Step has also been working to build a variety of additional Pinterest boards to help families find and use local resources, healthy recipes, parental educational materials, and much more. These forms of independence and family connections would not be possible without keeping up with modern technology and Diana is grateful for the opportunities it provides.




CLP Vacation Opportunity

Breakout Classes...Providing a variety of experiences




Community Link's Developmental Training Program encourages all of the participants to take part in various breakout classes. Every month participants are encouraged to sign up for different classes

which give them the opportunity to engage in a variety of experiences. Some examples of the breakout classes are:


Reading Room: Sue Ayers, a volunteer, comes in to read books to the participants. She brings in 3-5 books for them to choose from.

Life Skills: This class is an opportunity to discuss and practice proper hygiene and oral care.

Your Turn at the Table: In this breakout class, participants get the chance to choose a game. They play UNO, Bingo, Wii Bowling, card games and board games. They learn to take their turn and have a great time socializing.



Cooking Class: This class enhances participants' cooking skills. They learn how to read recipes, measure ingredients and practice proper sanitation. At the end of the class participants get to taste their creations.



Music Appreciation: In this class, a music artist or band group is selected. A brief biography about the artist or group is read by the staff and then they listen to a tape/CD of the music selected. Participants will sing along,

dance and sometimes get instruments to play along with the music. Everyone enjoys music and is interested to learn about the artist or band that was chosen.

Beauty Shop: This class is a day of pampering, so participants feel as though they are in a salon to make them feel as relaxed as possible. Appointment cards are made and given to the participants so they can choose what services they want. Services include hair, nails, lotion on hands and foot massage.


Music Class: Participants gather around the piano for a lively sing-along and take turns playing piano either with assistance or on their own. They're encouraged to take a bow when done.

Recycling Program comes to an end...

Community Link has had the privilege to serve our community over the past eight years through our recycling program. Following its 2008 inception as a drop-off site at its Breese East location, Community Link expanded its recycling program in 2010 by offering curbside pick-up to the residents of Breese. In 2011, the recycling program expanded again with the addition of Breese businesses and pick-ups at designated sites in the towns of Beckemeyer, Germantown and Damiansville. While serving a common good, Community Link's primary goals for starting and expanding the recycling program included offering opportunities for minimum wage work and community inclusion for participants as well as increased revenue for and awareness of Community Link.

As of June 30, 2016 Community Link has discontinued all components of its recycling program. Illinois' financially unstable environment, lingering budget impasse and years of underfunding from the Illinois General Assembly coupled with a deep decline in revenue received for recycling tonnage were all factors contributing to this decision.

Community Link is currently exploring some exciting alternate opportunities for minimum wage work and community inclusion for those participants who were involved in the recycling program. Community Link wishes to thank all those who have supported our recycling program over the past eight years. �







Adult-care workers rally for more staff to help clients

One of the greatest accomplishments of Patti Vardiman's career working with developmentally disabled adults came unexpectedly one day.

She was working with the learning series "Hooked on Phonics" when a middle-aged woman in her class caught her attention.

"I just put (in the CD) just to try it out to see if anybody would respond — and she's unable to move her hands — and she was sitting at the table moaning."

Vardiman went over to the table.

"She was actually following the CD and reading along with the CD and the book. It was time to turn the page, and she was unable to do that."

Vardiman said she was fascinated to learn more about her client, who had just turned 50. Varidman found out that she could read the text to her and so long as the questions were in a yes-or-no format, her client could answer them.

"We do so many things," Vardiman said of her work as a direct support professional, or DSP, at Community Link, the Breese-based organization with offices across the metro-east.

"We're interpreters," she said, adding later, "We're housekeepers. We're (certified nursing assistants). I can't stress enough to people that this is not a minimum wage job, and in order to get the staff that we need, we have to make (the job) more attractive and offer them more money."

Vardiman spoke at a press conference in Belleville on Tuesday, March 22nd on behalf of many metro-east direct support professionals at 16 organizations, as well as the people they work for, to draw attention to what John Huelskamp, the executive director of Community Link, described as a "growing crisis ... that threatens the core of the entire system of support" in community-based centers.

The organizations are worried that stories like Vardiman's could disappear without attracting more workers to the field through higher wages.

The support professionals work with an estimated 27,000 people with developmental disabilities in the state, 1,500 of which are located in the metro-east, according to the groups.

There are 34,000 direct support professionals in Illinois, and their average wage per hour is \$9.35, for a total of \$19,000 a year, for very "emotionally-draining" work, Huelskamp said.

The workers haven't received a pay increase in eight years, which makes attracting people to the field of adult care difficult. Over time, that means that clients are subject to more mistakes and inferior care, the organizations said.

"It's the equivalent to ignoring repairs in the bridges and roads," Huelskamp said.

Finding the right wage

There are two types of direct support professionals. The first work in "community facilities" and say they are paid less than those who who are unionized and work in state facilities.

About 45 percent of community-based direct support professionals, on the other hand, receive some form of public assistance, like SNAP benefits, better known as food stamps, Huelskamp said, and that paying workers more would relieve some of the burden on state aid.

He suggested raising the wage to \$15 an hour.

The pay increase wouldn't come solely on the back of Illinoisans, he pointed out. Because Medicaid reimbursements account for half

of the funding of community-based adult care centers, the federal government would also pick up half of the pay raise.

A pay increase would keep people at their jobs, which the forum attendees said they think is necessary to build and maintain relationships with their clients.

There are three levels of functionality clients possess, which require different numbers of support staff. Federal guidelines mandate one support worker for every 10 adults with high functionality, seven with medium functionality and five with low functionality. If programs don't meet those staffing levels, Huelskamp said, they could lose their funding.

That level of care on paper has strong reverberations in the real world, as Peter McManus knows.

McManus, a client who shares his home with three roommates in Quincy, said that it takes him a while to warm up to the right people.

"I'm very cautious about who I trust," he said.

McManus likes the freedom of his house and the help the support workers provide.

As for Patti Vardiman, who works in Fairview Heights, she knows the world of caring for adults with developmental disabilities inside and out. Not only does she work with clients at Community Link every day, but two of her family members also attend the program.

At home, however, she said she often feels guilty because she is always thinking about her job and new ways to help her clients.

"It takes time to be able to look at them and just know what they want or what they need. It could be a gesture. It could be a noise, a grunt, or whatever, and over time we can look at them and tell what it is that they want. Somebody else could walk in the room, and they would be clueless."

Vardiman stated, "I can't stress enough to people that this is not a minimum wage job, and in order to get the staff that we need, we have to make (the job) more attractive and offer them more money"

Two bills in the Illinois legislature haven't passed, leaving Vardiman at below \$12 an hour after more than two decades in the industry.

Still, she said, she has no regrets. After becoming a direct support professional in the early 1990s when she was between jobs, now, she said, she felt she has found her calling.

"Optimism is a cure for many things." - Michael J. Fox

Pessimism appears all around us. We are about to elect a new President in a campaign where both major party candidates are the most unpopular in history. The State of Illinois is halfway through a second year without a budget which is also an uninspiring historical first for any state. Confidence in government, big business, the media, and organized religion are at all-time lows. We live in an age of instant media where a barrage of bad news is a finger swipe away from entering our consciousness. As my colleague Dr. John Pingo notes, our brains are wired to be more sensitive to bad news and potential threats than to good news. While this lopsided focus on bad news may have helped our ancestors navigate through a dangerous world, it could serve as a detriment to our future.

While Community Link does periodically become ensnared by the Venus flytrap-like pessimism that surrounds us, we know it isn't the right place to be. Community Link faces a choice every day in embracing either a pessimistic or optimistic outlook. When considering all the dynamic and federally mandated changes coming at break-neck speed to our sheltered workshop and CILA programs, it is a natural tendency to gravitate towards the pessimistic camp.

The pessimistic paradigm offers that organizations like Community Link will be more vulnerable and unprepared for these changes because the State of Illinois has negligently failed to invest in us over the past ten years and currently offers no clear vision or direction of how to navigate through them. Furthermore, any resolution to the two year state budget impasse will likely entail further revenue cuts to a system that's already broken due to a lack of funding. This would limit the ability to retain current staff, attract new staff as well as reduce the quantity and quality of supports offered to participants.

When embracing an optimistic paradigm, however, the outlook takes a 180 degree turn. For example, these dynamic changes, while challenging in nature, are the direct result of advocacy efforts from persons with developmental disabilities themselves. They are no longer content with simply sitting on the sidelines and are becoming more adept at identifying what is important to them and finding ways to be heard. They want the same fighting chance as everyone else when pursuing their hopes and dreams and truly embrace Community Link's motto Disability to Possibility.

Community Link is at its best when operating through an optimistic prism. One of our current strategic goals is to accomplish "All stakeholders take ownership and live the mission, purpose and values of Community Link." By embracing optimism, Community Link has made significant inroads towards this goal. The best example is our annual Buddy Walk. This signature fund and friend raising event has grown from 200 registrants in 2011 to over 1500 registrants in 2016 and has increased donations from \$6000 in 2011 to over \$110,000 in 2016. While this may not resolve our financial dependency on the State of Illinois, it makes the future look much brighter.

Another example of an optimistic outlook is the recent uptick in community advocacy for our organization. Over the past decade, Illinois policymakers have continuously asked that persons with disabilities be supported by direct support professionals (DSP's) working at poverty-level wages or an average of \$9.35 per hour. The result of this refusal to pay a living wage is that most community-based organizations across the state are suffering through staffing



shortages and open positions which puts persons with disabilities living in the community at risk. Because of a community wide advocacy effort, both chambers in Illinois' General Assembly passed HB 5931. This legislation addresses the issue by mandating a minimum \$15.00 an hour wage to DSP's providing critical supports to some of our community's most vulnerable citizens. While the bill was vetoed last month, more advocacy efforts are underway to override it during the General Assembly's Veto Session following this fall's election.

In our Community Integrated Living Arrangement (CILA) program, we have made progress in decreasing the amount of adult participants having to share a bedroom or reducing the amount of people living in a home. While Illinois has not figured how to fund and support CILA participants having their own bedroom or having four people or less in a home, Community Link is making inroads towards this goal on our own.

There is also a spirit of optimism surrounding our approach to changes in our sheltered workshop and day training programs. While unable to currently add necessary resources, the programs are restructuring internally to afford more participants opportunities to interact in the community. We are seeking more opportunities for minimum wage community employment for participants as opposed to the current sub-minimum wage offered through sheltered employment. Participants are getting the opportunity to become more involved in the community through volunteerism. Some examples are our Fairview Heights location's "Go Room", which volunteers at the Belleville Food Pantry on a weekly basis and the Breese "Enlighteners" who deliver "Meals on Wheels" to senior citizens in Clinton County. We are slowly moving outside the traditional four walls without waiting on Illinois.

The support we receive from the community helps to bridge the gap between what we want to do for our participants and what we are able to do within the confines of the support of the State of Illinois. Volunteers who are able to provide education and experiences for our participants and donors that help us to complete projects to increase the quality of support we give to our participants are examples of things that help us to continue to move forward. While the path ahead for Community Link will continue to be filled with its share of potholes, we realize that by remaining optimistic, great things can still be achieved.

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
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


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
